

소아스는 아시아, 아프리카, 중동의 언어, 문화, 사회를 집중적으로 연구 해온 덕분에 복잡한 세계를 해석하 는 데 타의추종을 불허하는 역량을 보유하게 되었습니다. When one is engaged in studying Korea, the phrase "never a dull moment" often springs to mind and in the past year that phrase has been more apt than ever. In the space of a year we have swung from worrying about the possibility of a second Korean War to the first ever summit between the leaders of North Korea and US this May. As we now approach what will be the third inter-Korean summit in only a few months, we are also witnessing an unprecedented pace and depth of inter-Korean rapprochement.

As ever, the SOAS Centre of Korean Studies has been at the forefront of digesting and analysing current events as well as putting them into their crucial historical and cultural contexts. Our members have been featured frequently in all forms of media over the past year and we have hosted two important events discussing the current situation. The first of these was a roundtable discussion on North Korea and Northeast Asian Security, co-organised with the British Association for Korean Studies in December 2017 and the second an update on UK-Korean peninsula relations with UK ambassadors to both North and South Korea that was hosted in partnership with the British Korean Society in May 2018.

One of the great strengths of the CKS, however, lies in the diversity of approaches to the study of Korea that we are able to provide to SOAS and the wider community. The past academic year has seen the CKS host some 12 academic seminars with speakers from around the world talking on topics as diverse as queer literature, sports mega-events, digital humanities, contemporary art and seventeenth century history. In February we organised a significant symposium on legacies of colonialism in Korean historical memory, which will be featured in an upcoming special issue of the European Journal of Korean Studies. In addition we have hosted cultural events, a book launch, film and literature masterclasses and the UK premiere of a new documentary on modern Korean history.

The Centre of Korean Studies continues to be a home for visiting scholars working in a variety of different disciplines, many of whom come from South Korea. This year saw seven new visiting scholars arrive at SOAS, working on topics ranging from architecture to Korean linguistics and modern history.

I would like to thank both the Embassy of the Republic of Korea in the UK and the Korean Cultural Centre for their unstinting support for the CKS and their willingness to collaborate with us. I took over as chair only for the period from January until August, while Dr Charlotte Horlyck took a period of research leave, but it has been a privilege to work with the Centres Office and get to know how the CKS works from the inside out. My thanks to the Centres Office staff for all their hard work and my best wishes to Dr Grace Koh who is taking over as Centre chair from September 2018.

한국에 대한 연구를 하다 보면 "한시도 지루할 틈이 없 다"라는 말을 자주 떠올리게 되는데 지난 한 해를 설명 하기에는 이보다 더 적절한 표현은 없는 것 같습니다. 1 년 동안 우리는 제 2의 한국 전쟁의 발발에 대한 우려에 서부터 지난 6월 첫 북미정상회담까지 극한의 상황들을 겪었습니다. 그리고 이제 곧 몇 달 뒤에 이루어질 제3차 남북정상회담을 기대하며 두 국가간의 전례 없는 화합 의 행보를 지켜보고 있습니다. 늘 그래왔듯이 런던대학 교 소아스 한국학 연구소는 한국의 시사 문제를 역사적 및 문화적 상황과 환경을 고려하여 적용하고 이를 체계 화하고 분석하는 일에 앞장 서고 있습니다. 지난 해 우 리 연구소 회원들은 모든 미디어 매체에서 자주 소개되 었으며 우리는 현 상황을 논의하는 두 번의 중대한 행 사를 주관하였습니다.첫 번째 행사인 북한 그리고 동북 아시아의 안보에 관한 토론회는 2017년 12월에 영국 한국학회(BAKS: BRITISH ASSOCIATION FOR KOREAN STUDIES)와 공동 진행하였고 두 번째 행사는 주한 및 평양주재 영국대사들을 통하여 영국-한국 두 국가간의 최근 관계에 대해 알아보는 자리로 2018년 5월에 한영 친선협회(BKS: BRITISH KOREAN SOCIETY)와 함께 마련 하였습니다.

소아스 한국학 연구소의 많은 강점 중에 하나는 아무래도 소아스 대학 및 광범위한 공동체에 한국 연구에 대한 다양한 접근방법을 제시해줄 수 있다는 것입니다. 지난 학년도에 소아스 한국학 연구소는 12개의 학술적 세미나를 주최 하였고 다양한 국적의 발표자들께서 퀴어 문학, 대규모 스포츠 관련 행사, 디지털 인문학, 현대미술, 그리고 17세기 한국사에 대한 주제를 다룬 강연을 해주셨습니다. 2월에는 한국의 역사적 기억에 일부인 식민주의 유산에 관한 중요한 학술 토론회를 주관하였으며 이는 곧 발행될 한국학 유럽 저널(EUROPEAN JOURNAL OF KOREAN STUDIES)의 특별호에서 다뤄질 예정입니다. 뿐만 아니라 우리 연구소는 문화행사, 출판회, 영화와 문학관련 특별 수업 그리고 한국 현대사를 다룬 다큐멘터리 시사회를 주최하였습니다.

소아스 한국학 연구소는 다양한 영역에 종사하는 방문 연구원들을 위해 편안한 연구 환경을 제공해주었으며 연구원들 중 다수는 한국에서 방문하시는 분들입니다. 올해에는 건축학부터 언어학 및 현대사에 관한 연구를 진행하는 7분의 새로운 방문학자분들이 소아스 대학교 로 오셨습니다.

저는 소아스 한국학 연구소에 대한 주영대한민국대사 관 및 주영한국문화원의 아낌없는 지원 및 적극적 협업에 감사 인사를 드리고 싶습니다. 저는 샬롯 홀릭 교수님의 연구년 기간이었던 올해 1월에서 8월까지만 연구소장직을 맡았었지만 소아스 한국학 연구소와 함께 작업하고 연구소의 내 외부적인 활동에 대해 자세히 알게되어 영광이었습니다.연구소 직원들 모두의 노고에 감사한 마음을 전하며 2018년 9월부터 한국학 연구소장직 임기가 시작되는 그레이스 고 교수님의 성공을 진심으로 기원합니다.

During her sabbatical leave in terms 2 and 3, she took up a position as a Smithsonian Institution Senior Fellow at the Freer and Sackler Galleries in Washington DC where she researched Charles Lang Freer's acquisitions of Korean artefacts for her next book. She also gave talks on her research project at the Korea Institute at Harvard University, the Institute for Korean Studies at George Washington University, the Freer and Sackler Galleries and Yonsei University. She continues to serve as President of the British Association of Korean Studies.

KOREAN ART FROM THE 19TH CENTURY TO THE PRESENT

HORLYCK, Charlotte Reaktion Books, 2017

Korean artists are a permanent fixture on today's international art scene, as interest in modern and contemporary art from South as well as North Korea has grown in strength. Museums and individual collectors eager to tap into this rising market are acquiring many more Korean artworks. But how are we to understand Korean art and its cultural significance? What has led to the formation of Korea's cultural scene as we know it today, and what role have artists played in this process? These are some of the questions that frame the narrative in this richly illustrated history of Korean art from the late nineteenth century to the present day – a period which coincided with enormous and rapid political, social and economic change.

From artists' first encounters with oil paintings in the late nineteenth century to the varied and vibrant creative outputs of the 2000s, the book covers a critical and, from a cultural perspective, revolutionary period, signified by the breakdown of earlier artistic conventions and the rise of new art forms. Within this historical trajectory, Charlotte Horlyck explores artists' interpretations of new and traditional art forms ranging from oil and ink paintings to video art, multi-media installations, ready-mades and performance, and their questions about the role of art and the artist's position within society. This book will appeal equally to general and specialist readers wanting to explore this rich and fascinating epoch in Korea's cultural history.

This has been a busy year of teaching at SOAS with considerably larger numbers of MA students on Owen's modern Korean history courses than in previous years. He has also participated in a number of conferences and other

events, including a conference at the University of Hawai'i Manoa, entitled "Diversity, Identity, and Universality in Global Korea" where he presented a paper on "Convergence and divergence on the Cold War Korean peninsula through the lens of state capitalism theory."

Simon Barnes-Sadler completed his PhD in 2017. He continues to pursue Korean language research at SOAS as part of the project "Varieties of Korean: Global, Local, and Individual", supported by the Korean Studies Promotion Service of the Academy of Korean Studies (AKS-2016-LAB-2250003).

About the Thesis

The Korean communities of China and Central Asia are well-established Korean diaspora communities with comprehensively attested histories. Both find their origins in migration out of the North-East of the Korean peninsula in the mid-nineteenth century and, in addition to their common geographical and temporal origins, the varieties of Korean originally used by these communities have shared origins in the traditional Hamgyeong and Yukchin dialects of the Korean peninsula. The contemporary characteristics and (dis) similarities of these varieties – Koryo Mar (KM) in Central Asia and Vernacular Yanbian Korean (VYK) in China – are less well understood. The motivation for this thesis was addressing the questions of whether and how these varieties differ from each other on a sound empirical basis.

To this end, fieldwork was undertaken in Almaty Oblast, Kazakhstan and Yanbian Korean Autonomous Prefecture, China in order to record the relatively naturalistic speech of a wide-ranging sample of speakers of these varieties as they participated in semi-structured interviews.

Based on this transcribed data and prior attestation, parallel contrastive descriptions of KM and VYK were produced. Finegrained, qualitative analysis of these descriptions revealed not only a high degree of intra-varietal heterogeneity in both KM and VYK, but also numerous points of difference in the phonological and morphological inventories of the two varieties, despite the many similarities resulting from their common dialectological heritage. Quantitative techniques were then employed to identify the small sets of linguistic features which are particularly significant in distinguishing the transplanted varieties from one another. These findings contribute to a growing body of work which challenges the long-standing discourse surrounding the linguistic homogeneity of Korean.

Translation, National Ideology and the Cold War in the Republic of Korea (1949-1950)

Ye Jin Kim completed her PhD degree and graduated in 2018. Her current research interests include Korean modern history, Korean translation history, translation as activism, and narrative framing

About the Thesis

Ye Jin's research investigates how translations produced for the cultural Cold War projects by the South Korean as well as the US governments were used to promote ideological narratives to build the nation they desired. Employing socionarrative theories and evaluative language approaches, she examines the key documents and translations in the most popular magazines published by the governments in Korea: *Shinchunji* and *Wolgan Amerika*.

The main contribution of her thesis is that it reveals the interplay between the two aforementioned governments. The research shows that "anti-communist" and "prodemocracy" narratives are embedded in the key documents of Korea and "American supremacy" narratives in US foreign policy documents. It also shows that the narratives cannot be separated from the governmental need: South Korea's need to legitimate the purported "democratic" regime by demonising communism and communists and the need for the US to gain hearts and minds of Koreans to secure its hegemony in East Asia by implanting democracy with the consent of the Korean people.

The narratives detected in the translations are closely related to, and even more, are the exact reflection of, the narratives of both governments. The translators collaborated with the two governments and followed faithfully the policies of the translating institutions set by the governments. As a result, manipulations are detected at every level of translation. The translators of Shinchunji were faithful in framing anticommunist and pro-democracy narratives and the translators of Wolgan Amerika promoted narratives of American supremacy. Due to the popularity of the magazines, these narratives contributed to the formation of "communism-free" South Korea.

Markus BELL

Markus Bell is a social and cultural anthropologist currently based at the School of East Asian Studies, Sheffield University. His current research uses ethnographic research methods to examine contemporary outmigration from North Korea. Markus is particularly interested in the significance of multiple migrants' memories of movement and resettlement in shaping a diasporic identity. These issues are contextualised within the larger social processes and historical forces that shaped the latter half of the twentieth century in Northeast Asia, and the epoch defining challenges that continue to cast a long shadow on relations between North Korea, South Korea, and Japan. Markus is currently working on a book manuscript based on his research in Korea and Japan titled, 'Heaven Across the Water: Migration, Memory, and Identity in North Korea'.

Marjorie ALLTHORPE-GUYTON

Writer and curator Marjorie Allthorpe-Guyton trained as an art historian at the University of East Anglia. After PhD research at the Courtauld Institute, she published A Happy Eye, a history of Norwich School of Art 1830-1982 and British art education. In 1982/4 she was a selector for the Arts Council's British Art Show and became UK Contributing Editor for Flash Art, a contributor to Art Forum and in 1992 she was appointed Editor of Artscribe International. She was a Turner Prize judge in 1994. Marjorie Allthorpe-Guyton was National Director of Visual Arts, Arts Council England 1993-2006. She is an Honorary Fellow of the Royal College of Art and the Royal Institute of British Architects. Her most recent essays include 'Monuments to Hubris', on the Venice Biennale 2017, in Populism, Critical Muslim 24.

Kerry BROWN

Kerry Brown is Professor of Chinese Studies and Director of the Lau China Institute at King's College, London, From 2012 to 2015 he was Professor of Chinese Politics and Director of the China Studies Centre at the University of Sydney, Australia. Prior to this he worked at Chatham House from 2006 to 2012, as Senior Fellow and then Head of the Asia Programme. From 1998 to 2005 he worked at the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office, as First Secretary at the British Embassy in Beijing, and then as Head of the Indonesia, Philippine and East Timor Section. He lived in the Inner Mongolia region of China from 1994 to 1996. Professor Brown directed the Europe China Research and Advice Network (ECRAN) giving policy advice to the European External Action Service between 2011 and 2014. His recent publications include: The New Exmperors: Power and the Princelings in China (2014) and What's Wrong with Diplomacy: The Case of the UK and China

Javier CHA

Javier Cha is an assistant professor of East Asian Studies in the College of Liberal Studies at Seoul National University. Before moving to South Korea, he worked in the Netherlands and Hong Kong. As a historian of medieval and early modern Korea, he is interested in the social, philosophical, and geopolitical factors that contributed to Korea's adoption of the Confucian tradition. Cha is also committed to experimenting with computational methods in historical studies. His current project in digital history involves the discovery of unidentified assemblages using the agnatic and affinal data of 50,000 individuals and the automated classification of 198 million characters worth of writing. In addition to macrohistorical research, Cha has been dabbling in anthropological history in the Annales sense, capturing local knowledge and information using high-resolution photographs, audiovisual sources, and drone footage.

Pavel EM

Pavel Em is a Research Fellow at the School for Advanced Studies in the Social Sciences (École des hautes études en sciences sociales), in Paris. He holds a DSc in Social and Economic Geography from Lomonsov Moscow State University and has published and presented extensively in both English and Russian on urbanisation on the Korean Peninsula.

Masato HASEGAWA

Masato Hasegawa received his Ph.D. in History from Yale University in 2013 and is currently a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science in Berlin. Previously, he taught Chinese, Korean, and East Asian history at the University of Oregon, Columbia University, and New York University. His research has centered on the question of how human lives, animals, and technologies intersected in the Asian borderlands, in particular the Sino-Korean borderland in the early modern and modern periods. His dissertation, "Provisions and Profits in a Wartime Borderland: Supply Lines and Society in the Border Region between China and Korea, 1592-1644," examined the devastating effects of war mobilization on the society and farming cycle of the Sino-Korean borderland from the late sixteenth to the early seventeenth century. He is currently revising his dissertation for book publication and preparing a new project on the notion of reliability in the use of transport technologies in the Sino-Korean borderland of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

Jim E. HOARE

Jim E Hoare is an Associate Fellow of the Royal Institute of International Affairs (Chatham House), and a Research Associate at SOAS, where he obtained his PhD in Japanese history in 1971. He joined the British Diplomatic Service in 1969 and served in the British Embassies in Seoul and Beijing. In 2001-2002, he was the first British representative in Pyongyang, DPRK. Since retirement in 2003, he has been a teacher, writer and broadcaster.

Henry MEYRIC HUGHES

Henry Meyric Hughes is Honorary President of AICA, in Paris, Chair of the International Awards for Art Criticism in London and Shanghai, and a member of the Scientific Advisory Board of the Archives de la critique d'art and of the International Scientific Committee of Critique d'art/ The International Review of Contemporary Art Criticism, in Rennes. He worked for 24 years with the British Council in Germany, Peru, France and Italy, ending up as Director of Visual Arts in London, before leaving to become Director of the Hayward Gallery, London, in 1992. Since 1996, he has worked as an independent curator and writer about art. He was a cofounder and the founding president of Manifesta: The European Biennial of Contemporary Art (1993-2007). He has been a frequent curator and commissioner at the Venice Biennale and São Paulo Bienal and (co-) curated numerous national and international exhibitions of modern and contemporary art, including the 30th Council of Europe exhibition, Critique and Crisis/ The Desire for Freedom: Art in Europe since 1945 (Berlin and international tour, 2012-14). He has been special adviser on exhibitions for the Council of Europe and has been decorated by the Czechoslovak, French and German governments.

Jaeho KANG

Jaeho Kang is Senior Lecturer in Critical Media and Cultural Studies, SOAS. Kang has been working on the sports mega-events in East Asia with particular reference to the media spectacle and the formation of national identity.

KIM Seung-Hee

Kim Seung-Hee is a critically acclaimed poet and Emeritus Professor of Korean literature at Sogang University. She made her official literary debut with her poem, "Kŭrim sok ŭi mul" (Water in the Painting) in 1973, and also gained recognition as a fiction writer with her short story, "Sant'ap'e ro kanŭn saram" (On the Way to Santa Fe) in 1994. In addition to essays, short stories and a novel, she has published nine volumes of poetry: Sun Mass (1979), Concerto for the Left Hand (1983), Love Song for Incompletion (1987), Life within an Egg (1989), How Shall I Get Out? Her accolades include the Kyunghyang Shinmun's New Writers' Award (1973), Sowol Poetry Prize (1991), Ko Jeong-Hee Literature Award (2003), and Korea's This Year's Art Awards (2006). Collections of her poetry in English translation include I Want to Hijack an Airplane (Homa & Sekey, 2004) and Walking on a Washing Line (EAS Cornell University Press, 2011).

Tat Yan KONG

Tat Yan Kong is Reader in Comparative Politics and Development Studies at SOAS, University of London, and Co-Director of the London Asia-Pacific Centre for Social Science (SOAS and King's College). He is interested in issues of comparative and international political economy (varieties of capitalism, socialist to market transition, regional integration) with reference to East Asia (and to the Korean Peninsula in particular), and is the author of *The Politics of Economic Reform in South Korea: A Fragile Miracle* (London and New York: Routledge, 2000). Brother Anthony of Taizé was born in Cornwall in 1942. A member of the Community of Taizé since 1969, he has been living in Korea since 1980. A prolific translator, since 1990 he has published well over forty volumes of translations of Korean literature, mostly contemporary poetry, including work by Ko Un, Jeong Ho-Seung, Shim Bo-Seon, Do Jong-Hwan, Oh Sae-Young, Kim Seung-Hee, Cheon Sang-Byeong, etc. as well as fiction by Yi Mun-yol and many others.

John TREAT

John Whittier Treat is Emeritus Professor at Yale University. He is the author of *Writing Ground Zero*: Japanese Literature and the Atomic Bomb (Chicago, 1995), Great Mirrors Shattered: Homosexuality, Orientalism and Japan (Oxford, 1999) and a novel, The Rise and Fall of the Yellow House (Big Table Publishing Company, 2015). He has published on authors Yi Kwang-su in the Journal of Asian Studiesand Im Hwa in Trans-Humanities; and his work on Chang Hyŏkchu appears in the University of Hawai'i Press volume The Affect of Difference: Representations of race in East Asian Empire. Treat's The Rise and Fall of Modern Japanese Literature is forthcoming in 2018 from the University of Chicago Press, and he is currently writing a book on pro-Japanese Koreans writers under Japanese rule.

Colonialism and its Reverberations: 'Comfort Women' and Historical Revisionism in Korea and Japan". A symposium on historical controversies in South Korea

3 FEBRUARY 2018

A CKS symposium on controversies in modern Korean history was held on a Saturday afternoon, attracting an audience of around 60 for a rare opportunity to hear three prominent scholars working in the field of East Asian historical memory and historiography. The symposium gave rise to a lively discussion on matters relating to scholarship on the so-called 'comfort women' and the recent issue of government-mandated textbooks in the Republic of Korea.

Professor Yonson Ahn of the University of Frankfurt presented a paper entitled "The Contested bodies of Korean comfort women", looking at how the 'comfort women' (women forced into prositution for the Japanese military) are remembered in contemporary South Korea. Her paper specifically focused on the difficult question of the relationship between women and nation and how in postcolonial South Korea women's bodies and sexuality had become the property of the masculinised nation. Meanwhile, Japanese neo-nationalists also constructed Korean comfort women within a patriarchal paradigm as "willing participants" in the Japanese imperial project.

The paper presented by Professor Younghwan Chong of Meiji Gakuin University approached the same topic from a different angle, focusing on the recent controversy surrounding the work of South Korean scholar Park Yuha and her book "The Comfort Women of Empire" (제국의 위안부) and the role of liberals in Japan in promoting a sort of revisionism on controversial historical topics. His paper was entitled "Two types of revisionism: historical perceptions and the consciousness of Japan's Military Sexual Slavery".

Finally, Professor Vladimir Tikhonov of the University of Oslo presented a paper entitled "Old Right in New Clothes? The "New Right" and its Quest for Ideological Hegemony in South Korea". Professor Tikhonov carefully analysed the rise of the New Right tendency within South Korean academia and its attempt to introduce a new type of right wing revisionist history to Korea. Although this tendency began with the criticism of traditional nationalist history, from around 2006 it became increasingly focused on the fetishisation of 'modern

capitalist civilisation' and argued vigorously for the importance of the Japanese colonial period in laying the foundations for South Korea's later economic success. However, although the New Right achieved some short-lived success under the Park Geun-hye government in getting government-mandated history textbooks approved,

it has been in decline and never achieved much success in establishing its view of Korean history either in scholarly circles or in the wider arena of public opinion and historical memory.

FILM SCREENING British premiere of the docume

British premiere of the documentary 'The Longest Tomb'

29 MAY 2018

In May the Centre of Korean Studies played host to the UK premiere of an important new documentary on one of the bloodiest episodes in modern Korean history: the Daejeon Massacre of summer 1950, in which the South Korean government killed thousands of suspected leftists at the start of the Korean War. The Longest Tomb, produced by Knowledge is Power and The Education Centre for Peace and Reunification, is the first ever documentary on the controversial subject of the mass killings near Daejeon. The film was

presented with English subtitles and included an introduction from the production team. The screening was followed by testimonies from two of the witnesses appearing in the film: Ms Jeon and Mr Lee, who traveled from South



Korea to tell their stories. There were readings from Ms Jeon's recent book of poetry on the massacre and a question and answer session. The event was a powerful and moving chance to learn about one of the most painful periods in Korea's history, and a very rare opportunity to hear from those who were actually affected, as the children of massacre victims.

Mr Lee, who spoke at the screening, was recently featured on the BBC World Service programme Witness: www.bbc.co.uk/ programmes/w3cswshy

Knowledge is Power is an internet podcast that covers local politics in the Daejeon area. Set up by Mr Chinho Jung in 2017, it is a non-profit organization that aims to provide a space for the empowerment of Daejeon citizens.

The Education Center for Peace and Unification is a cultural center in Daejeon promoting peace and reunification. Mr. Jaegeun Im, an instructor, is the film's narrator.



CONCERT SOAS Korean Music Societies Annual Concert 9 June 2018

This academic year was again brimming with Korean traditional music activities at SOAS. Beginning with the Korean Drumming Society under the initiative of Professor Emeritus Keith Howard more than a decade ago, Korean traditional music at SOAS has now multiplied into five different societies, each of which focuses on another area: SOAS now hosts societies for Korean drumming (among which we have the widely known Samulnori), singing (Pansori and Minyo), wind instruments, Gayageum (a zither-like string instrument) and traditional dance. Not only does this wide array of available Korean performing art forms promote the cultivation, study and awareness of Korean culture at SOAS, but also, it allows students to gain precious and colourful experience to support their own learning, and enrich the unique knowledge that can be acquired here. Once a year, students from the different societies give a performance that they have developed over the year. This year's concert was espcially well-received, exciting furious participation and applause from the audience, and closing off the evening with a second half where audience members could play traditional Korean games, or try out some of the instruments themselves.





SOAS Library is one of the world's most important academic libraries for the study of Asia, Africa and the Middle East, which attracts scholars from all over the world to conduct research. The Library houses over 1.2 million volumes at the SOAS campus at Russell Square in central London, together with significant archival holdings, special collections and a growing network of electronic resources.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

The Library holds some 80,000 items for Korean studies including publications from North Korea and over 500 audio-visual materials for teaching and research in Korean studies. The SOAS online catalogue is available at http://lib.soas.ac.uk/. The SOAS Digital Collection has been growing in recent years. Images for Korean studies are available in the Collection.

The Library purchased an archival database *The Korea Times* (1956-2016) in 2017. It also subscribes to major research databases including Korean language databases with financial support from the Korea Foundation (US\$4,500 in 2018). New subscriptions to Kyobo Scholar and Koreascholar began in 2017. The details are available at the Library's databases list. External members are welcome to use these databases in the Library.

The Library has received more reading lists this academic year in comparison to previous years. The lists are helpful in identifying the needs for additional copies and e-books. The Library aims to replace paper copies with e-books for core reading titles.

As in previous years, the Library has received resources for Korean studies from various institutions in Korea including the Academy of Korean

Studies, Dongguk University, the Institute for the Translation of Korean Classics, Korea Foundation, Korean Film Archive, Korean Publishers Association, Kyujanggak Institute for Korean Studies, Literature Translation Institute of Korea, National Assembly Library of Korea, National Institute of Korean History, National Library of Korea, National Museum of Korea, Northeast Asian History Foundation, and Suwon Museum.

Chris DEACON MA Korean Studies and Intensive Language (Korean)

Contrasting the South Korean and Japanese governments' approaches and policies towards North Korea regarding the 'abduction issue' (working title)



The CKS Bursary has covered the first year of Chris's two-year master's degree in Korean Studies and intensive Korean language at SOAS.

Chris intends to specialise in modern and contemporary relations between South Korea, North Korea and Japan, particularly with regard to how such relations interact with the societies of these countries. With an existing background in Japanese Studies, Chris has undertaken this degree in order to obtain in-depth specialism in the Koreas, as well as ability in the Korean language, so as to assist with research in this area.

In his first year, Chris has concentrated his study on the modern and contemporary history of the Korean peninsula, pre- and post-division, as well as Korean language. As part of the course, he has also spent ten weeks during the summer studying Korean at Korea University in Seoul. Further language study in the second year of the course will allow him to use Korean language texts in his dissertation research and, hopefully, in future doctoral research.

In his second year, Chris intends to concentrate on regional relations and politics. His dissertation will focus on the North Korea 'abduction issue' and seek to contrast South Korea and Japan's approaches to this issue. While Japan, particularly under Abe Shinzo, has given this issue paramount importance in its regional policy, South Korea has tended to raise the issue only quietly, if at all.

Without the CKS Bursary, it would have been unlikely that Chris would have been able to undertake this degree, so he is very grateful indeed to have received it. It has also meant having more time to focus on his studies. Chris is also very grateful that the second year of the course will be supported by a generous Graduate Fellowship from the Korea Foundation.

Yasmin Elisha MICHAEL MA Korean Studies

From Annexation to Demilitarisation: Spatial Theory and Korean Literature between 1910 and 1953



Yasmin's main topic

and interest of her dissertation is to try and identify a trajectory between the act of physically mapping locations, spaces and their boundaries and spaces of the mind through a discussion of Korean literature and spatial and post-structuralist theory. Through the lens of literature the dissertation will look at several shifts within Korean history in which both the geography of Korea and perceptions of self identity were challenged or altered. After being accepted to study abroad for a year in Seoul during her Bachelor's degree, Yasmin began to develop a strong academic interest in Korean literature and media which then motivated her to apply for a postgraduate degree in Korean Studies. Yasmin previously studied English Literature for her undergraduate degree and developed an interest in language and its links to our identities and perceptions of others. This interest has only increased during her Masters as she has been encouraged to look more at the cultural and personal factors involved in the presentation of one's identity through a text and the socio-political space that Korea occupies.

Thanks to the CKS bursary she has been able to take a step further her career, making her Master's degree possible. She hopes to continue her studies further within in the discipline and next embark on a PhD using knowledge and research gained from her MA in Korean studies as the foundation. Yasmin is highly grateful to CKS for the opportunity to continue her education and research in an area that she is very passionate about.

Looking in the Mirror of Theory: Reading Bahc Yiso's Art Through His Theoretical Writings on Postmodernism (working title)

So Yoon's dissertation looks at South Korean artist Bahc Yiso (1957-2004), particularly a body of his conceptual artworks and written works produced during his residence in New York from 1982 to 1995. The dissertation aims to provide a dual yet integrated lens to look at the artist, by considering him as both an artist and a theorist of postmodernism. It first discusses two published articles by Bahc and their contributions in localising (and transcending) the Euro-American discourse of postmodernism in the 80-90s South Korea. Then, by using these theories as a guide to read his artworks, it further examines how Bahc's art becomes a mirror of his texts but simultaneously seeks to evade their theoreticism, by voiding the artworks' reference points from the formal realm and thus making the works abstract in their form and plastic in their meanings.

So Yoon came to SOAS to study modern and contemporary art in non-Western context, while developing her area interests in East and Southeast Asia. Studying art history in this institution, whose own dedication lies in deconstructing the canon and developing alternative ways to look at art, has been a truly transformative experience on both personal and academic fronts. So Yoon is grateful to the CKS Bursary for providing her means to be at SOAS and helping to focus her research on contemporary South Korean art. She further hopes to realise the bursary's broader objective, by becoming a scholar who uncovers historically overlooked artworks and seeks to promote a meaningful intercultural dialogue.



Building a New World: North and South Korean economic and political development in the late 1950s-early 1960s in the context of the Cold War in East Asia



Natalia is doing a PhD in Modern Korean history. Her research looks at the period of the late 1950s-early 1960s in North and South Korea, the time when some of the most important choices in economic and political spheres were being made. Combining political and economic analysis and social history, this project aims to compare North and South Korea's strategies of political and economic development at that time their relations with their main allies - the USSR in case of the DPRK, and the USA in case of the Republic of Korea, and the effects that the state policies had on the everyday lives of the people. It is expected to reveal how the differences and similarities in the external and domestic situations of the two Koreas influenced the choices made by the leaders. To achieve those goals, the project uses a variety of primary sources, among them the declassified documents from the former Soviet archives in Moscow, and South Korean archives in Seoul; the published works and speeches of the North and South Korean leaders; and the periodicals from the two Koreas.

Natalia is most grateful to the Centre of Korean Studies for its generous support, without which she could not have afforded to undertake research at SOAS. She hopes that her project, made possible by the CKS Bursary, will contribute to better understanding of the period of Cold war in East Asia and in Korean history.


